Part II of our programs on "A Tale of Two Salems" is scheduled for Friday, November 30. One speaker will be **Dr. Sandra Husk, Superintendent of Salem-Keizer Schools**. Dr. Husk earned her B.S. in Elementary Education at the University of Georgia, Athens. She earned her M.A. in Guidance and Counseling from the University of Colorado, Boulder, and her Ph.D. in Administration, Curriculum & Supervision from the University of Colorado, Denver. Her work history includes leadership at every curriculum level, and in positions ranging from school counselor to superintendent of schools.

Dr. Husk will share the latest developments and trends in Salem-Keizer Schools. She will speak about what needs and challenges are greatest, and where needs are most concentrated. She will identify compelling recent developments, and she will tell us how we can help.

Diana Hall, our second speaker is coordinator of Schools Uniting Neighborhoods (SUN) in Portland. SUN was developed eight years ago by a partnership of Multnomah County and the City of Portland. It has grown from being active in the neighborhoods of 8 schools to serving the communities centered around 56 schools this year. It is an innovative and uniquely effective program for working for positive and fundamental change - **one neighborhood at a time**. Come and hear how it is done!

Diana Hall grew up in Salem and is a graduate of South Salem High. She earned a B.A. in Russian language and culture from Reed College and then went on to earn a Masters in Teaching (MAT) at Portland State. Diana spent five years coordinating and training the workers on the Crisis Hot Line in Portland and during those years developed an acute awareness of needs in neighborhoods of Portland. She has worked since 1999 to develop, expand, and strengthen SUN. What exactly is SUN? How does it work? Who funds it? Might we want to consider something similar in Salem? Come join the community conversation. Your experience and ideas are needed. **What future do we want to be a part of - and help create?**
